Targa Tasmania - Event Overview

With a proud history dating back to 1992, Targa's reputation has been built on the ability to deliver high quality tarmac rally events in unique destinations within Tasmania, Victoria and Queensland.

Targa Tasmania covers every corner of the unique island of Tasmania and is one of the worlds most unique driving experiences. Do not miss the excitement and energy of Targa Tasmania.



Safe Spectating Guidelines

Targa Tasmania takes place on public tarmac roads, within Tasmania. Targa uses designated sections of road, closed for the purpose of the timed competition.

These designated stages are known as Targa Stages and their closure is authorised by the relevant government agency, as well as the Tasmanian Police.

The success of Targa Tasmania relies heavily on the co- operation of all individuals. It is important that all spectators respect, listen and follow any instructions given from event organisers and Targa appointed officials. It is vitally important to ensure spectators are safe at all times when watching a Targa event. Our officials, and the Police ,will not allow a stage to start until all spectators are positioned in what they consider to be a safe location.

All spectators are required to be on the Targa stage and in their viewing area prior to the road being officially closed, and spectators may not leave until the 'road open' vehicle has passed through. There is to be no parking on the closed roads. It is important that spectators are aware and consider the fact that they can be on a Targa stage for up to six hours, especially those with young children.

Targa suggests that consideration be given when choosing a stage to watch. A junction or intersection allows for access in and out during the road closure times.

Targa runs to the minute, so no access will be given from either end of the stage during the running of the stage.

It is important to be aware that cars under competition conditions can lose control and leave the defined road at any time. Spectators must not stand in any areas which are not authorized, or which are contrary to the advice of the organisers and officials. It is important that spectators can react to an approaching vehicle at all times.

Officials are positioned on the Targa Stages to ensure the safety of all spectators. Targa Tasmania asks spectators to respond to all requests from officials and Targa staff. Spectators may be asked to relocate; this is for good reason and with the safety of all in mind.

Spectators must not imitate Targa competitors. This only reflects poorly on Targa Tasmania, and motorsport as a whole.

Pets are not recommended in public spectating areas. If a spectator elects to bring their dog, it needs to be kept under control and on a lead at all times.

Children must be supervised at all times whilst spectating a Targa Stage.

Targa asks that all spectators keep clear of all controls (start and finish points), including from the timing marker to the control area.

Control officials may ask spectators to move if obstructing their ability to perform their job. If a spectator does wish to see a control point, then Targa requests standing well back and responding to any instruction given by the officials.

Risk Warnings, Disclaimer & Indemnity Signs

Motorsport Activities are inherently dangerous recreational activities and there is significant risk of injury, disability or death. If you do not wish to be exposed to such risks, then you should not attend at or participate in Motorsport Activities.

WARNING: If you participate in these activities your rights to sue the supplier under the Competition and Consumer Act 2010 (Cth)* if you are killed or injured because the activities were not supplied with due care and skill or were not reasonably fit for their purpose, are excluded, restricted or modified in the way set out in or on this sign. In exchange for being able to attend or participate in the Motorsport Activities, you agree:

- 1. To release Targa Australia Pty Ltd to the extent that any or all of them are providing recreational services from all liability for:
 - a.your death;
 - b.any physical or mental injury (including the aggravation, acceleration or recurrence of such an injury);
 - c.the contraction, aggravation or acceleration of a disease; the coming into existence, the aggravation, acceleration or recurrence of any other condition, circumstance, occurrence, activity, form of behaviour, course of conduct or state of affairs:
 - i. that is or may be harmful or disadvantageous to you or the community; or
 - ii. that may result in harm or disadvantage to you or the community, howsoever arising from your participation in or attendance at the Motor Sport Activities;
- 2. To indemnify and hold harmless and keep indemnified Targa Australia Pty Ltd to the maximum extent permitted by law in respect of any claim by any person; and
- 3. To attend at or participate in the Motorsport Activities at your own risk.

NOTE: The change to your rights, as set out in or on this sign, does not apply if your death or injury is due to reckless conduct on the supplier's part.

"Motorsport Activities" means any motorsport activities or recreational services which are permitted or approved by Targa Australia.


"Reckless Conduct" means conduct where the supplier of the recreation- al services is aware, or should reasonably have been aware, of a signifi- cant risk that the conduct could result in personal injury to another person and engages in the conduct despite the risk and without adequate justification. See section 139A of the Competition and Consumer Act 2010.

Do's and Don'ts of Safe Spectating

- Cars under Competition conditions can lose control and leave the defined road at any time.
 Do not stand in any areas which are not authorised, or which are contrary to the advice of the Organisers and Officials/Marshals.
- Be prepared. Consider the varied weather and ensure you bring hats, ground cover, sunscreen and protection in case of rain or cold weather. Ensure you have adequate food and drinks available in the event that there are delays with roads opening.
- Park your car sensibly so that it will not obstruct emergency vehicles, competitors, service
 crews or other members of the public. In all cases, ensure you obey parking instructions
 given by supervising Officials. It is recommended to park your car facing outwards to make
 for an easier departure.
- Do not try to imitate Targa drivers. Remember that if your behaviour gives cause for complaint, it will reflect badly on the event, and the sport. Drive carefully both to and from Public Viewing Areas and be ready to give way, if necessary, on narrow stretches of road.
- Do not light fires (unless otherwise permitted to do so in a safe environment) or smoke in any Public Viewpoints.
- Do not smoke near a car that is being serviced or refuelled.
- At all times keep clear of controls, including from the timing marker to the control area. If control Officials ask you to move, please help them by doing so - remember they have a job to do. If you do want to see a control point in action, remember to stand well back from the control area
- Take all litter home with you it is handy to have a bag or carton in your vehicle. Litter left along the course reflects badly on the event.
- Do not crowd mechanics when they are working and ensure you are a safe distance from vehicles at all times to avoid potential injury.

Spectator "No Go" Zones

Please familiarise yourself with the below diagrams to ensure you are **never** standing in a 'No Go Zone' when spectating on a Targa Stage




Safety Tape Standards / No Standing Areas

Safe public spectating areas are marked by yellow safety tape. Spectators are asked to view the Targa stages from behind this tape.

There is to be no spectating where blue/white striped or red/white striped tape is marked.




2025 Targa Tasmania Map

Below is the 2025 Targa Tasmania map, outlining the various "Legs" and "Targa Stages" for the event.

Each Leg represents a different day of the event, and each Leg is a different colour.

Targa Tour

The Targa Tour cars are first vehicles you will see on the Targa stages once the roads are officially closed, and they will come through in close-knit 'packets' of around ten cars, led by a Targa Tour Leader.

These vehicles are usually standard road cars not competing in the event, and they are speed limited to 120km/h.

Targa Competition

Targa competition vehicles run from fastest to slowest. The cars start at thirty second intervals and race against the clock, and themselves, with the fastest car over all stages being crowned the winner of Targa Tasmania.

The vehicle numbers are based on the competition category that car is entered in, and the competition field is split into three different maximum speed limits: 130km/h, 160km/h and 190km/h.

The cars within the highest speed limit category will come through the stage first, followed by the lower speed limited vehicles.

It is important that spectators remain patient as the entire field passes through, as the road will not be open for the public to drive on until the final "Road Open" vehicle passes.

The Targa Tasmania Course

There are a number of fantastic locations to watch Targa Tasmani, however caution must always be taken when choosing a safe location. There may be Targa stages that provide little or no opportunity to safely view the Targa competitors.

It is suggested that spectators take some time before the day to go and choose their spectacting spot and ensure it complies with the safety diagrams in this document.

Spectators may be asked to move to a different location by Targa Officials on the day if their chosen spot does not meet the guidelines listed in this document.

Spectators can also view the Targa cars during the road transport sections, where the Tour and Competition cars travel between Targa Stages.

We have included stage maps in this document, along with road closure times to assist with safe spectating.


Ceremonial Start - 16 November 2025


Targa Tasmania will officially begin at 1pm on Sunday 16 November.

The Ceremonial Start location will be in Salamanca, and this is a great area to come and watch the cars officially begin the 6 day event.


Cars will cross the Ceremonial Start Line in Salamanca before heading to their first Targa Stage.









Leg Two - 17 November 2025



BASKERVILLE




SYMMONS PLAINS


The 'Symmons Plains' Stage is on the dedicated Symmons Plains Raceway circuit and is free for the public to access and spectate on the day.

The Targa cars are expected to be on track between 1:45pm & 3:30pm.


